Now You Know



Little Gestures with BIG Meanings! You've noticed, we're sure, that we Catholics perform dozens of quick gestures almost habitually without thinking and often without considering what they mean.

When we hear the name of Jesus, we quickly, almost unnoticeably, bow our heads to honor Him and His Name: "that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend" (Phillipians 2:10). We genuflect toward the tabernacle which holds the real presence of Jesus in the

Holy Eucharist – before we sit down it is appropriate to give reverence to our Lord and Savior.

When we recite the Creed, we bow slightly as we say, "...and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary and became man." That He became a man to live among us to show us the way to heaven is the second most important event in salvation history (His resurrection is the most important).

We bless ourselves with holy water when we enter the church – that act symbolizes our leaving the secular world behind and entering into sacred space with Christ just as our souls did at baptism. When we leave, we again bless ourselves as if to ask God to keep our souls safe as we return to the world outside.

When we recite the Penitential Act we strike our breast three times as we say, "...through my fault, through my fault, through my most grievous fault;" The beating of the breast is an outward sign of inward contrition. The pain on the inside is mimicked by that of the outside – much like that of the tax collector who asks Jesus to have mercy on him, a sinner (Luke 18:13).

When Father begins the reading of the Gospel and says, "A reading from the Gospel according to St....," we respond Glory be to God and we make the sign of the cross on our foreheads saying, "May the Word of the Lord be on my mind," then we sign our lips, "May the Word of the Lord be proclaimed by my lips," and, finally the cross over our hearts to say, "May the Word of the Lord pierce my heart."

When we pay attention to these little gestures, we get an extra spiritual lift out of the Mass. Gestures can mean a lot!
