Prayer of Spiritual Communion for Those Who Cannot Attend Mass

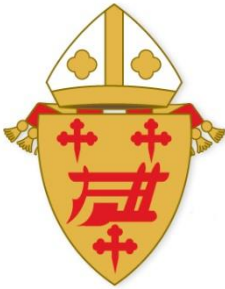

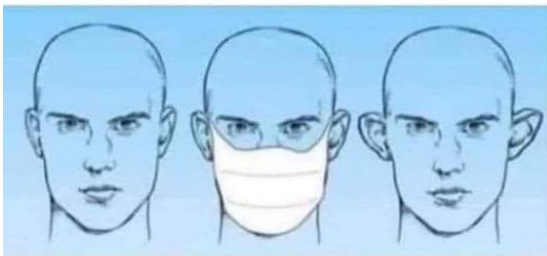
Next Sunday, November 1st, is All Saints Day. It is a Solemnity and is usually a Holy Day of Obligation; however, this year it falls on a Sunday which is, itself, a Holy Day of Obligation so there won't be any addition to our Mass schedule for this weekend.

We look forward to this day as a day of celebration of all the saints whether we know them or not. We often think of "saints" as those individuals who have died and were canonized by the Church as being examples of holiness worthy of emulation. But St. Paul tells us in many of his letters that all true believers are saints. We might be saints depending on the depth of our faith and the conduct of our lives. There are perhaps millions of saints, living or dead, whom we do not know but, yet, can look to as models of faithfulness in our Lord Jesus.

Regarding those saints who are in heaven, we believe that, through their prayers to God on our behalf, miracles might occur to help us during our pilgrimage on earth. In the process of canonization, the Church thoroughly investigates the life of a person who is thought to be worthy of sainthood. By their life, and by evidence that they are indeed with God and have His ear, so to speak, the Church declares that we can ask for their intercession and that we can revere them as truly holy persons. But, still, let us not forget that we might be sitting next to a real saint in church, on a bus, or anywhere – another reason to respect all humans.
