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O clement, O loving, O sweet Mother Mary, we, your children of every nation, turn to you in this pandemic. Our troubles are numerous; our fears are great. Grant that we might deposit them at your feet, take refuge in your Immaculate Heart, and obtain peace, healing, rescue, and timely help in all our needs. You are our Mother. Pray for us to your Son. Amen.

This year, the Jewish feast of Passover begins at sundown on Saturday, March 27th, and ends at sundown Sunday, April 4th (Easter for us). Religious observers will eat the *Seder* or Passover Supper during the evening on Sunday, March 28th (our Palm Sunday). The word “Seder” actually means “order” which makes sense because the celebration follows a set order or formula. Many of us have attended at least one *Seder* – some perhaps more authentic than others – so we can relate to the feast and the symbols it incorporates.



It is believed that the obligation to tell the story of the Exodus was observed by Jews ever since the actual Exodus itself. The scriptural command (Exodus 13:8) to tell the story of the Exodus to our children is interpreted as a positive commandment.

One of the four names for Passover — and sometimes the aspect most emphasized — is *Hag ha-Herut* (The Holiday of Freedom). Freedom is one of the primary themes of the *Seder*. The *Seder* permits Jews to worship God through prayer, study, and learning by taking part in what is essentially a lesson of Jewish history, literature, and religion. Participation lets one symbolically and vicariously relive the Exodus.

We don't know if the night of the Passover was as frightening as it was portrayed in the movie *Ten Commandments* but we can imagine that many of the Jews suffered from some form of anxiety. You can read the story for yourself in the Book of Exodus. If you don't have a good readable Bible, call us – we'll give you one.
