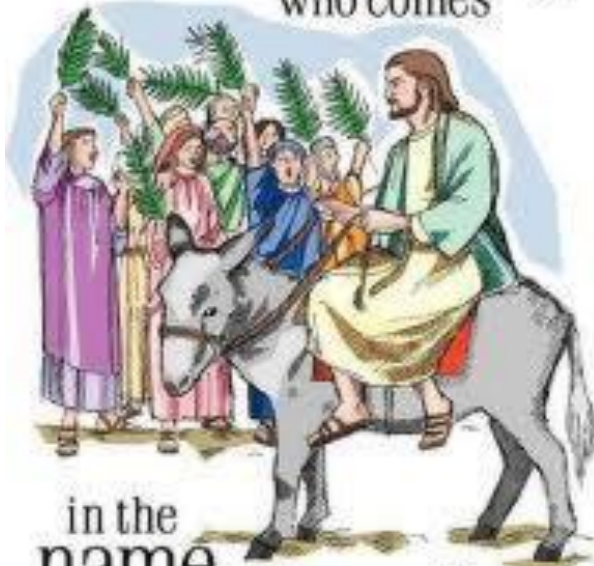

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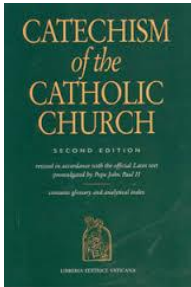
Catholics in good health over the age of 14 should abstain from meat on Good Friday. Catholics in good health between the ages of 18 and 59 must also fast (i.e., limit themselves to only one full meal or two small meals).

*Catholics are commanded to receive Holy Communion at least once a year, traditionally, during the Easter Season – thus called “Easter Duty”. Tradition also urges that we receive the sacrament of Reconciliation at or near the same time. We believe that if it has been a year or more since we last received these two sacraments, we are in dire need of them. The Lenten Penance Service is a great time to confess and do penance.

What We Believe and Why We Believe It

"...the only begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages."



The Council of Nicaea (325) defined the Church's teaching on this matter by saying that the second person of the trinity was not created, but rather existed from all eternity with God the Father. There was never a time when the Son of God did not exist. Thus we proclaim that He was begotten, not made. What is the difference between "begotten" and "made?" When a man and a woman conceive and bear a child, it shares in the similarities of its parents. However, the child is a separate, independent being; it has its own unique nature. This is not true with the Son. He was not just similar to the Father; He was one in being with Him. It means that He is of the same substance or nature with the Father. Begotten means bringing forth something of the same nature or substance.

Similarly, the word "born" has an entirely different meaning here than we are accustomed to using it. Here, the word's meaning is something like "carried" or "lifted up" or "brought forth" but never created. He, like the Father, always was.

God is one substance in three persons not one "what," but three "whos." That was the truly great revelation of the Trinity. It's not just that God takes on different personae or faces when dealing with the mortal world -- another popular but heretical view -- but that there are actually eternal relationships "inside" God. God is One, in being and mind and will, but God is never singular.

In the end, it is a mystery. One we might understand when we get to heaven but one, which, for now, remains a mystery that most of us find difficult to totally comprehend.

study selected passages from the Pentateuch, Prophets, Wisdom, and New Testament texts, in order to examine the theme of creation in the Bible, its function within its immediate and canonical contexts, and its relation to salvation. **"Preambles of Faith"** (Monday and Wednesday evenings) will study the compositions of Flannery O'Connor, which have attracted many people to Catholicism. The course will attempt to appreciate the inherent value of O'Connor's stories as works of art and to assess their instrumental value as preambles of faith. The tuition cost for each course is \$870; for auditors, \$450; and for alumni auditors and senior citizen auditors (65+), \$250.
