Now You Know



A week from this Tuesday on July 10, Father Carl will offer Holy Anointing during Mass to persons who are suffering from serious illness, facing serious surgery, or are 65 years old or older. Holy Anointing was once called “Last Rites” or “Extreme Unction” (meaning last anointing) but, now, its title “Anointing of the Sick” is more descriptive of what it really is.

It seems that people are afraid to ask for anointing, fearing, perhaps, that the act signals the beginning of the end for them. We’ve had people actually scoff at us when we have suggested that they receive anointing.

Anointing of the Sick is one of the seven sacraments of the Church. It comes to us straight from Holy Scripture as attested to by St. James:

Is anyone among you sick? He should summon the presbyters of the church, and they should pray over him and anoint [him] with oil in the name of the Lord, and the prayer of faith will save the sick person, and the Lord will raise him up. If he has committed any sins, he will be forgiven (James 5:13-14).

When Jesus sent out the Twelve Apostles, “They cast out many demons, and anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them” (Mark 6:13).

Therefore, one can see that the sacrament is not necessarily “Last Rites”, although it should be administered when our earthly existence is nearly complete, there are many times in most lives when it can be of great value.
