Theology of the Body

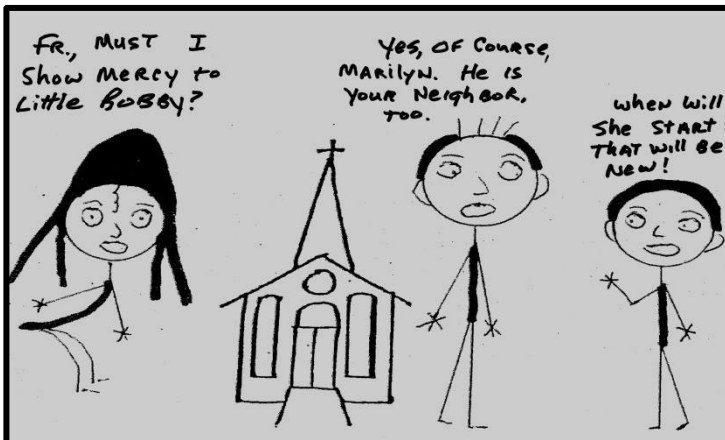
Why doesn't the Church get in step with the modern world?



What is it about our bodies that make them the basis of a theology? First, and most obvious, is that God created us as male and female – we have bodily differences and it is through those differences that we come to know and love each other.

Our bodies allow us to experience the world – to gain wisdom about it as well as discover our own being. Moreover, the body performs the work of the creator: ***“The Lord God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to till it and keep it”*** (Genesis 2:15 NRSVce). It is the body that becomes aware that we are supreme over other creation: ***“So out of the ground the Lord God formed every animal of the field and every bird of the air, and brought them to the man to see what he would call them; and whatever the man called every living creature, that was its name. The man gave names to all cattle, and to the birds of the air, and to every animal of the field; but for the man there was not found a helper as his partner”*** (Genesis 2:19-20 NRSVce). As St. JP II puts it, “man gains the consciousness of his own superiority, that is, that he cannot be put on a par with any other species of living beings on the earth.” It is not until God creates Eve that man has a worthy partner, “flesh of his flesh”.

The body, too, is subject to the temptations of Satan: ***“Have you eaten from the tree of which I commanded you not to eat?” The man said, ‘The woman whom you gave to be with me, she gave me fruit from the tree, and I ate.’ Then the Lord God said to the woman, ‘What is this that you have done?’ The woman said, ‘The serpent tricked me, and I ate’”*** (Genesis 3:11-13 NRSVce); in other words, they both succumbed to bodily desire. Because of Adam’s failure to obey, we are prone to the temptations and sins of the body (concupiscence). For example, Jesus said, ***“But I say to you that everyone who looks at a woman with lust has already committed adultery with her in his heart”*** (Matthew 5:28). But, of course, that is only one example of the many temptations with which we are surrounded.
