blown on it? Crazy times!

Many Protestants believe in what they call “personal interpretation of Scripture” – meaning, of course, that they can figure out all kinds of meanings from the words of the Bible. Knowing that explains why there can be more than twenty-thousand sects or denominations of Christians. If you learn about some of them, you will marvel at many of their beliefs and practices – all of which were “commanded by God” in Holy Scripture.

One example stems from today’s Gospel from Saint Mark:

“What mighty deeds are wrought by his [Jesus] hands! Is he not the carpenter, the son of Mary, and the brother of James and Joses and Judas and Simon? And are not his sisters here with us?” And they took offense at him. (Mark 6:2-3)

Most Protestants point to this passage to prove that Mary was not perpetually virginal. It seems to us that their “proof” is shortsighted, ignoring differences in language, translation, and culture. If they would do their research they would learn that in that ancient culture any relative, especially cousins, were called “brother” or “sister”. Even we, in our prayers, call each other brothers and sisters.

Imagine a civilization one thousand years from now finding a scrap of newspaper from Cincinnati. Let’s say the headline read “Packers slaughter Bengals”. What are they to believe? That people butchered and ate tigers? If their archeologists investigated the practices of the thousand-year-old culture, they would find out about American football and that the Packers and Bengals were two of many competing teams in a game. That knowledge changes everything.

Rest assured that Catholic scholars have done and continue to do exactly that. We can rely on their interpretations and explanations – it’s important that we not read the Word of God in a vacuum.
