## Now You Know



Have you ever wondered why Fr. Carl pours a tiny bit of water into the wine before consecration? There are several reasons why this practice is required of all priests at Mass and some are a little elaborate. It is believed that in the ancient world long before Christ, wine was very strong, thick, and gritty requiring it to be diluted a little before drinking. Jesus Himself might have added some water to the wine at the Last Supper and the Apostles continued the tradition even after better wine came along.

When he pours the water into the chalice, the priest prays, “**By the mystery of this water and wine may we come to share in the divinity of Christ who humbled himself to share in our humanity.**” The water symbolizes Christ’s humanity and the wine, His divinity; just as one cannot take the water back out of the wine, Christ’s divinity and humanity cannot be separated.

The mixture also memorializes the Passion as Jesus shed blood and, when His side was pierced, water poured out. Some writers like to compare the water to us, the people, and the wine to Christ meaning that we are a part of Him and He is a part of us – inseparable.

If you would like to have a Mass offered for a loved one you have lost, or for someone who might be suffering somehow, there are "Intention" envelopes on the table in the back of church. You may fill one out, put \$5 inside for each Mass you want, and drop the envelope in the collection.

Votive candles are still only \$3. They burn for 6 days. We don't count the candle money separately so it's okay to just drop the \$3 in the collection basket.

Beginning July 5 through August 21, registration is open for fall courses at the Athenaeum of Ohio. Whether you are interested in earning a master's degree or taking classes for spiritual enrichment, the Athenaeum is there to help you. They offer degree and non-degree programs, and day, evening, and weekend classes. Classes for the fall include Old Testament Scriptures, Sacred Scripture Seen through Sacred Art, Church History, Social Doctrine, and Apologetics. The Catholic Research Resources Alliance has digitized, indexed, and posted online issues of *The Catholic Telegraph* from its founding in 1831 through 1885 at The Catholic News Archive. The issues are text-searchable and ready for download. There are plans to digitize further content of the newspaper when funding is secured. A separate project with the Public Library of Cincinnati and Hamilton County is to digitize the newspaper from 1831-1922 (the end of public domain).
