Last year on November 8, 2019, Pope Francis declared a Jubilee Year of Loretto to be celebrated from December 2019 to December 2020. The Jubilee was to mark the 100th anniversary of the dedication of Our Lady of Loretto as the patroness and protector of pilots and air travelers. Just last week, however, the pope ordered that the jubilee be extended for another year until December of 2021 because of the Covid 19 restrictions.

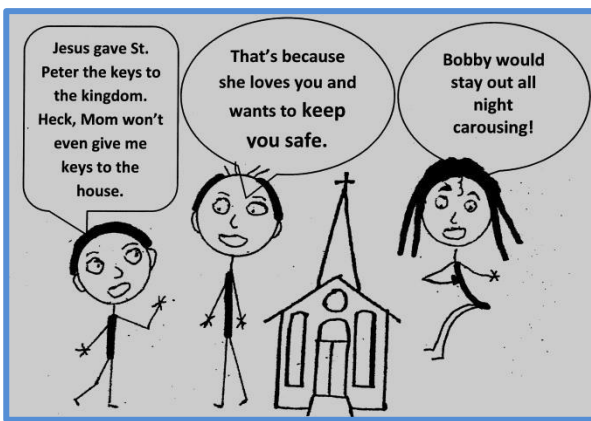
Our Lady of Loretto, or, more accurately “The Holy House of Loretto” is a shrine in Loretto, Italy, said to be the house where the Blessed Virgin Mary was born. Yes, she was born in Nazareth, Israel, but legend has it that angels picked up her house and carried it from there to Loretto; flying as it were from one place to another (hence the patronage of pilots and air passengers). Whether true or not, thousands of Catholics like the story and have developed a devotion to the site and make regular pilgrimages there. Vatican officials and other researchers claim that sufficient evidence exists to validate the legend.

If you make a pilgrimage to it or any other Loretto shrine, go to confession, and say a rosary for the intentions of the pope, you will receive a plenary indulgence (the total remission of punishment for your sins).

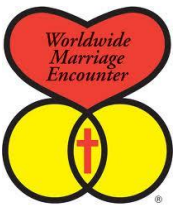
