\*Saint Pio of Pietrelcina, O.F.M. Cap, (aka Padre Pio) was an Italian priest who was known for his piety and charity, as well as the gift of the stigmata, which has never been explained. From his tender age, Francisco had a peculiar ability. He could see guardian angels and he spoke with Jesus and the Virgin Mary. At the age of 15, Francisco entered the novitiate of the Capuchin friars at Morcone. He took the name of "Pio" in

honor of Pope Pius I, whose relic he often saw at his local chapel. On one occasion during prayer, a fellow monk astonishingly reported he saw Pio levitate during an episode of ecstasy. Others have reported that Pio appeared in two different places at the same time (bi-location). There are many, many examples of his wisdom and prophetic nature and we encourage you to read about this special saint. You may venerate the official relics of Padre Pio at St. Peter-in-Chains Cathedral October 3 from 8 am to 8 pm. Archbishop Dennis M. Schnurr will celebrate Mass at 7 p.m.

## Now You Know

Every person has the right and the moral duty to seek the truth, especially in what concerns God and his Church. Once the truth is known, each person has the right and moral duty to embrace it, to guard it faithfully and to render God authentic worship. At the same time, the dignity of the human person requires that in religious matters no one may be forced to act against conscience nor be restrained, within the just limits of public order, from acting in conformity with conscience, privately or publicly, alone or in association with others.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) says,

"All men are bound to seek the truth, especially in what concerns God and his Church, and to embrace it and hold on to it as they come to know it." This duty derives from "the very dignity of the human person." It does not contradict a "sincere respect" for different religions which frequently "reflect a ray of that truth which enlightens all men," nor the requirement of charity, which urges Christians "to treat with love, prudence and patience those who are in error or ignorance with regard to the faith." The duty of offering God genuine worship concerns man both individually and socially. This is "the traditional Catholic teaching on the moral duty of individuals and societies toward the true religion and the one Church of Christ." By constantly evangelizing men, the Church works toward enabling them "to infuse the Christian spirit into the mentality and mores, laws and structures of the communities in which [they] live." The social duty of Christians is to respect and awaken in each man the love of the true and the good. It requires them to make known the worship of the one true religion which subsists in the Catholic and apostolic Church. Christians are called to be the light of the world. Thus, the Church shows forth the kingship of Christ over all creation and in particular over human societies. (CCC 2104-2105)
