\*Many Jewish Americans observe Rosh Hashanah, known as the New Year in the Jewish calendar, for two days, while others celebrate the event for one day. It is a time of family gatherings, special meals and sweet foods. Many Jewish people celebrate Rosh Hashana by eating *challah* bread and apples dipped in honey. Unlike the secular New Year in the Gregorian calendar (January 1), Rosh Hashana is a time of judgment and remembrance, on which God reviews and judges a person's deeds in the past year. It is a time of prayer and penitence. All debts from the past year are supposed to be settled before Rosh Hashana. Many Jewish people in the United States seek forgiveness from friends and family prior to this event. The Shofar (horn) is blown at some point during the celebrations.

\*\*Patriot Day was instituted in 2002 to commemorate the almost 3000 people who were killed in terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001. It is not a national holiday. Patriot Day should not be confused with Patriot's Day, also known as Patriots Day, which commemorates the battles of Lexington and Concord in 1775, which were two of the earliest battles in the American Revolutionary War. It is a holiday in several states.



# Now You Know



We celebrate the birth of the Blessed Virgin Mary on its traditional fixed date of September 8, nine months after the December 8 celebration of her Immaculate Conception as the child of Saints Joachim and Anne.

The circumstances of the Virgin Mary's infancy and early life are not directly recorded in the Bible, but other documents and traditions describing the circumstances of her birth are cited by some of the earliest Christian writers from the first centuries of the Church. These accounts, although not considered authoritative in the same manner as the Bible, outline some of the Church's traditional beliefs about the birth of Mary.

They tell of her parents, Joachim and Anne, who were childless and began to devote themselves extensively and rigorously to prayer and fasting, initially wondering whether their inability to conceive a child might signify God's displeasure with them. As it turned out, however, the couple was to be blessed. An angel revealed to Anne when he appeared to her and prophesied that all generations would honor their future child: "The Lord has heard your prayer, and you shall conceive, and shall bring forth, and your seed shall be spoken of in all the world."



**Weekly Prayer at Local Abortion Centers:** After the closing of the abortion center in Sharonville, there are two remaining surgical abortions centers within the boundaries of the Archdiocese of Cincinnati. **Every Saturday, at 8 A.M.**, come to **Holy Name Church** (2422 Auburn Ave. in Cincinnati) for Mass followed by Exposition, a rosary procession to the nearby Planned Parenthood facility, and return to Holy Name for benediction. Joining in these rosaries is a peaceful way to stand for life!

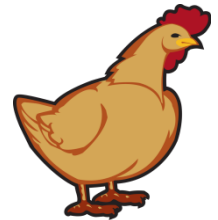
